A New Year Message from Bishop Tom

In ancient Israel Jewish boys learnt to write by copying verses from The Book of Proverbs and in doing so they learned more than the skill of reading and writing, they took in a curriculum for humane living. They learnt to distinguish right from wrong, to love justice and mercy. They learned the social



skills to relate to the family and the community, and above all to relate to God.

Earlier generations in Britain taught young girls social skills in a basically similar way by getting them to embroider verses from scripture or poetry with uplifting messages. I inherited from my mother such a piece of embroidery which she had made as a young girl. It is from the pen of the Victorian poet Adam Lindsay Gordon and reads "IN THIS LIFE OF FROTH AND BUBBLE; TWO THINGS STAND LIKE STONE: KINDNESS IN ANOTHER'S TROUBLE, COURAGE IN OUR OWN."

I suspect that Her Majesty the Queen, as a young girl, went through the same discipline of embroidering uplifting verses because she quoted from those words in her first Christmas broadcast in 1952. Maybe the words came back to her mind recently as 2021 carried with it the recent death of Prince Philip and 2022 carries the promise of her Platinum Jubilee in June.

During these months of a parish interregnum coinciding with the challenges of a COVID pandemic, many people at St Helen's and St Paul's have stepped up and shouldered together the strands of Christian leadership which make the parish such a special place. We have seen innumerable examples of kindness and courage and we thank God for them. I believe that, although 2022 will bring its own challenges, the parish is well equipped to eventually welcome its new vicar, and with courage and kindness move into a future full of opportunity and hope.

Hymns Ancient and Modern - an article from our organist

Lift up your heart, lift up your voice; rejoice, again I say, rejoice'
'O worship the King, all glorious above; O gratefully sing his power and his love
'Be still, for the presence of the Lord, the Holy One, is here'

Selecting hymns for worship is both a **privilege** and a **challenge**. They are chosen according to the season in the church year, their relationship to the readings and any theme for the day. They should complement each other and where possible, be in a variety of styles.

It is often said that the quality of congregational singing can be a barometer to gauge the spiritual life of the church. To help us we have a tried and tested hymn book - 'Ancient and Modern: Hymns and Songs for Refreshing Worship'. The first edition of A & M was published in 1861. In 2013, more than 150 years later and after sales of over 200 million copies, the latest edition, as used in church today, was published.

As a chorister, I purchased my first copy of A & M in 1957 - the Standard Edition first published in 1922 containing 779 hymns. I also have on my bookshelf the 1950 Revised Version of 635 hymns together with the 1983 New Standard Edition of 533 hymns which brings us to our current book of Hymns and Songs for Refreshing Worship which contains 846. The fluctuation in numbers shows that the collection has changed over the years as has its title. You can read more about the history of A & M in the preface of our hymn book when you are next in church.

So how many different hymns do we sing? Well, in the current seasons from the first Sunday of Advent (28th November 2021) through Christmas and Epiphany until the end of January 2022, we have (or will) sing 45 different hymns of which five will be repeated. Week in, week out, I chart the number of hymns we sing to come to almost 200 per year.

That only leaves 646 more and I am sure the worst thing is that we haven't sung your favourite! Please let us know if that is the case and we will do our best to oblige but of course, you have to sing the first verse as a solo!! Seriously we look forward to hearing from you. OK - so that is request number one!

Request number 2 - I know from comments received that you enjoy the support given by the choir in leading the singing during the act of worship. Not only do they sing well but look well in their robes - well, the ladies do but the gentlemen's cassocks are beginning to show their age. Is there a seamstress who could help to give them a new lease of life before we send them to be cleaned (that is the cassocks, not the men).

I look forward to hearing from you and on behalf of myself and the choir, wish you all a Blessed and Happy New Year!
