#### From our vicar, Revd Hannah Smith

Back in June last year, we had an away day for all our PCC and staff team and a few other key leaders in the church where we talked about how we wanted to be and where we wanted to go as a church community across our parish.

I was so encouraged to hear that those gathered were so greatly 'on the same page' with lots of similar senses of direction. Out of that day and further prayer and conversations, we now have a new sense of vision for the coming months and years.



We've based them around three words – home, hope and hands.

- Firstly home God is always calling us home to him, and our church is the home where we all gather together. We want people to feel at home with us so that we can welcome people home to the God who loves them so much.
- Secondly hope I am so aware of the hopelessness that we find in our world so much at the moment, with war and climate change. Yet, we are people who have hope – hope in a God who came close to us in Jesus and whose death and resurrection changes everything. We are called as a community to live in the hope we have and share that hope with others.
- Finally hands God calls us to be his hands and feet in the world. We don't just talk about faith, but we are called to live it out in words and actions. Hands reminds us to serve, to practice forgiveness and love and to pray and care for others.

These are great words because they are simple and accessible, yet they are rich and we will keep learning about how to live them out together.

Can I encourage you to be praying about these words and what they look like embodied in us and in our parish?

### Every Good Work Youth Project update

I'm coming towards the end of my first month in post as the Youth Worker for the Every Good Work project and I haven't been sacked yet, so must be doing something right. It's been a month of getting ready and putting things in place to get things up and running and going

forward. Jacob and Joshua and I have between us met with somewhere between 100 and 150 young people in the various schools and are planning to begin our out of school youth work just after February half term.

We are beginning a group on a Monday evening at the Portobello Community Centre, and on a Tuesday straight after school at St Swithun's as well as going into schools each week with CROSS club teaching and helping with lunchtime clubs. There will be much more exciting new things to come, and it won't take long before we are all rushed off our feet trying hard to remember what a 'day off' feels like.

Things are starting to take shape and feel more real. Its really exiting to be at a point in the project where we are creating the work from the ground up and then being able to do it. Its great being involved so much in shaping this project and taking the vision of Every Good Work forward and beginning to see it as a reality.

There are three main areas in which we need prayer and support. The first is please keep on praying for Joshua, Jacob and myself that we are in the right places at the right times to be effective in working with and listening to the young people we come into contact with. Secondly, please pray that they are receptive to us and that the young people are in the right places at the right times to be able to work with us.

Thirdly we need people who can volunteer to give up a small amount of time to help us with the youth clubs with the young people out of school. It is really important that these young people meet with Christians to show them the love and kindness of Christ. People who are willing to spend an hour playing games, listening and chatting with them. ### Holocaust Memorial Event

On Sunday 28<sup>th</sup> January we welcomed Charlie Knight, a PhD student at the University of Southampton to give us a talk about Ernst and Gertrud Neustadt, a German-Jewish couple who are buried in our churchyard. Charlie told us that in the mid-1930s, Ernst and Gertrud were living in Frankfurt, where Ernst was headteacher of the Goethe Gymnasium. When the Nuremberg Laws were enacted, Ernst was removed from his post and had to take up a lower paid post at a nearby school. In the late 1930s, letters were sent on Ernst's behalf to

various schools and institutions in the UK, asking them to consider supporting Ernst's migration, but the responses were invariably negative. Eventually, in July 1939 he managed to get a visa to be able to migrate to the UK and work at Gordonstoun school in Scotland. However, Ernst, along with other refugees working at Gordonstoun were declared 'enemy aliens' and detained in late 1939 in a camp on the Isle of Man. Ernst was released in August 1940 because of 'extreme hardship'; potentially because his wife had been diagnosed with cancer, but we cannot be sure of this. He didn't return to Gordonstoun and eventually took up a teaching post in September 1941 at Wakefield Grammar school. On the 30th March 1942 Gertrud died and was subsequently buried in St Helen's graveyard, with a small grave marker. Ernst lost his job very soon after this, and tragically took his own life on the 24<sup>th</sup> April 1942, less than a month after Gertrude had died. He was buried in his wife's grave, without a marker.

The triple impact of forced migration, internment and the challenge of finding work led a formerly great academic to take his own life. When we think about genocide, we must remember that survival is not always a success story, and the ripples of hatred spread far and wide. In marking Holocaust Memorial Day, we must be ready to challenge hatred and discrimination, so that 'Never Again' is not simply an empty epithet. Following Charlie's talk, we made our way down to Ernst and Gertrud's grave, where Linda read a short prayer in Hebrew and all present promised to remember them, and all victims of hatred.



An extract from Catherine Lee's most recent Link Letter

**Location:** Taiwan **What I do:** Working with the Taiwan Episcopal Church, supporting the church, chaplaincy and kindergarten ministry of the Diocese of Taiwan.

#### Dear friends,

"Let the light of Christ shine... in the darkness of our hearts... in the dark alleys of our cities... in the rejected places within us..."

Today I celebrate 25 years since I first arrived in Taiwan, looking back with great gratitude! Thanks be to God and to all of you who have supported me for these 25 years. As I walked in the pouring

rain yesterday past some of Taipei's dark narrow alleys, I remembered the above prayer, which was very meaningful when I first arrived in Taiwan all those years ago. I remember the dark days and nights of my first winter in Taiwan, and every winter since – when the rain pours down and the dampness intrudes into every part of life, when the mosquitoes, cockroaches and termites lurk in the dark, damp corners, and when the daily struggle of trying to communicate in a different language and culture often seems impossible. The darkness of this world is also much in evidence on our screens and this month we have the added drama of Taiwan's presidential election. Yet somehow the light of Christ shines through in the meaning and purpose of being here, along with the joys of friends, fellowship, faith and a whole lot of fun.

As Christmas Day was a Monday, it was a normal work and school day in Taiwan. Our diocesan office was open, and I was very honoured to be invited by Bishop Chang to join the staff that morning in the office chapel for their Christmas Day service, and to be godmother to his eight-month-old granddaughter, Ruei-Shi. (see photo). And then on to New Year's Eve, which we celebrated in central Taipei at the huge outdoor "Taipei Blessing" concert, featuring a choir and orchestra of 450 people performing hymns and songs of faith from all over the world. I am grateful that my 25 years in Taiwan were preceded by seven very formative years in Tanzania and it was especially moving to hear stunning performances of the Swahili classics "Baba Yetu" and "Yesu Kwetu Ni Rafiki", which brought back so many wonderful memories of East Africa. Wishing you all a Happy New Year 2024 and Happy Chinese New Year of the Dragon on 10 February!

### A Sandal Enigma - What happened to the Misses Briggs?

If you visit St Helen's Church, you will find sixteen graves in the cemetery which are of the standard design for servicemen, some being dated 1919. This is not surprising, as they could have died of their wounds when being cared for in hospitals in Wakefield, and as Spanish flu killed millions of people just after the War, severely injured men could also have succumbed to the disease.

Inside the Church there is a memorial at the west end to the men from Sandal who died in the First World War. At the bottom of the list, separately from the men, there is the name of Dorothy Briggs VAD. Who was she? And why is her name there?

The VADs (short for Voluntary Aid Detachment) were women who helped out in various ways during the Great War, as drivers, clerks and so on, but best known as untrained auxiliary nurses. They often came from middle and upper class families, to do their bit for the country, and what was expected of them came as a real shock to many of them, having previously lived sheltered lives. There was initially some tension between them and the trained nurses, but as the War went on their contribution was greatly appreciated.

As throughout the country, there were hospitals in Wakefield where soldiers recuperated from their injuries, and many VADs worked there. There are records of three VADS by the name of Briggs who worked at St John's Hospital. One was Miss Dorothy Briggs of The Cliffe, Sandal, who served 8,265 hours as a nursing sister with quartermaster's duties at St John's from 10 April 1915 to 28 February 1919. Miss Marjorie Briggs, of the same address, also served there as a nursing sister, while Miss Barbara Briggs of Beechfield, Sandal, undertook canteen duties.

So much for the records. Were they sisters? Were they from the Briggs family who ran a mill at the bottom of the Barnsley Road? If Miss Dorothy Briggs was the one named on the plaque, when did she die, and what caused her death, which would have been after she completed her service as a nursing sister, and not during the War? It would be interesting to know her story, and why her name was recorded.

Do you know the Briggs family? They may have stories handed down about Dorothy which can explain why she is named on the plaque in St Helen's. Article by David Lane (Sandal Methodist Church) Submitted for our interest by Mike Keeton
