Celebrating the First Anniversary of the Coronation of King Charles III

And all the people shouted and said "Long live the King" (I Samuel 10: v24)

As you might expect, I have a shelf full of different hymn books collected over many years. A quick check in the section entitled 'National', without exception contains:-

- I vow to thee my country, all earthly things above Author - Cecil Arthur Spring-Rice (1859-1918)
 Tune - Thaxted (from the Planets Suite):
 Composer - Gustav Holst (1874-1934)
- And did those feet in ancient time
 Author William Blake (1757-1827)
 Tune Jerusalem: Composer Charles Hubert
 Hastings Parry (1848-1918)
- God save our gracious King/Queen
 Author Unknown (c1745):

Tune - National Anthem (from Thesaurus Musicus c1743)



Of the three hymns, surely, 'God save the King' has the greatest significance but we know least about its author and composer.

It is said 'God save great George our King' received its first known public performance at the Theatre Royal, Drury Lane in 1745 sung by men enlisted to fight for the King. The anthem was taken up by other theatres and sung in public places. It seems first to have been sung in churches during bouts of illness of George III when new verses were added to pray for the King's deliverance and to thank God for the King's recovery.

Footnote:

- A & B appear in most hymn books with C falling in and out of favour (author unknown)
- D first appears in 'God bless our native land' by William Edward Hickson
 (1803-1870) an attempt to write a more religious National Anthem and
 with slight modifications, appears in the new 2023 Revised English Hymnal.
- E and F (with A) from the 1919 Official Peace Version of the National Anthem

Facts:

- A catchy tune to an unusual metre 664. 6664.
- One of only two tunes in Ancient and Modern to this metre, the other being 'Moscow' to 'Thou, whose almighty word'.

Can you find any other verses set in the past as part of the National Anthem?

News from one of our local Parishes:

Whitsuntide in Horbury

On Whit Sunday 19th May Horbury organised an event to commemorate the 100th Anniversary of the death of the Revd Sabine Baring-Gould the curate of Horbury in 1865 who was the writer of the hymn "Onward Christian Soldiers". He foundered the school and mission church-St John's at Horbury Bridge and wrote Onward Christian Soldiers to encourage the children of Horbury Bridge in their



mile and half uphill Whit Walk to St Peter's Horbury.

Sabine Baring-Gould was an eminent victorian parson, hymn writer, author, Devon country 'squireson', and collector of west country folk songs. Most of his hymns have been forgotten with the exception (apart from OCS) of "Now the Day Is Over", and the translations from Latin "Sing Lullaby" and "The Angel Gabriel from Heaven Came". He is famous in Horbury for his courtship and marrying of the mill girl Grace Taylor. (see

It was a lovely sunny day a week last Sunday as the procession set off from Horbury Bridge up to Horbury-the Horbury Victoria Band playing the famous hymn. Fr. Christopher Johnson ,Vicar of Horbury, said there were some 500 people in the procession or walking along with it. I must admit that I didn't walk just met the end of it at Horbury Church.

The Church was packed -standing

room only. Lord Hope of Thornes (David Hope sometime Bishop of Wakefield, Bishop of London and Archbishop of York) gave the sermon, Bishop Tony led prayers and the children of Horbury Bridge Academy and St Peter's school, sang modern childrens songs including a form of 'Onward Christian Soldiers' to an Abba tune.

Grace Taylor:

From Horbury mill girl to Lady of the Manor

Sabine Baring-Gould met Grace Taylor when he was curate of Horbury bridge in 1865 when she was 15. Grace had been working at Poppletons mill in Horbury since she was 10-a child amongst the deafening click-clatterings of the spinning "mules", the thumping of the overhead shafting, the whirring transmission belts, air filled with wool fibres, her nimble little fingers used to tie broken threads, her small body used to clean under the machines-all whilst still running. Enough to give a modern health and safety officer a nervous breakdown.

Grace was uneducated - though she could read and write and taught younger children at the Sunday School at St John's Horbury Bridge. Sabine sent Grace aged 15 to a the family of a fellow cleric in York to be educated and taught the refinements of a victorian middle class girl. They married in 1868 at St Peter's Horbury , when Grace was 18 and Sabine 34 and had their first child in 1869. The first of 15-the last being born in 1891 when Grace was 41.

They left Horbury to another parish in North Yorkshire; then to another in Essex. Sabine's father died in the 1870s and he inherited the family estate of Lew Trenchard in Devon. His uncle who was the Rector of Lew Trenchard, died shortly afterwards and as the Living was in the gift of the Lew Trenchard estate, he appointed himself Rector.

It is thought that George Bernard Shaw got the idea of his play "Pygmalion" (later the musical 'My Fair Lady') from this story. In the 1912 play Eliza Doolittle a semi-literate cockney flower seller was educated, taught refinement and given elocution lessons by Professor Higgins as a social experiment and to pass as a 'lady' in 'high society'.

In the play however Eliza is the centre of the action but in the real life story of Grace Taylor, she is very much in the background. What did she think of the transformation of her life? what did her family think? Was she cut off from her family? Was she simply to busy with her 14 living children (one died) to think about anything much? She died in 1916 aged 66.
